



Sports Grant - allocation, use and impact

Sport Funding Report 2024 - 2025

The Government initially provided additional funding for academic years 2013/2014, 2014/2015 and 2015/16 to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding in order to improve the provision of physical education and sport in primary schools. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to schools to be spent on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. All state-maintained schools, academies, middle schools, special schools and pupil referral units which have primary aged pupils will receive the funding. They have since agreed to extend this successful program for additional years.

The total amount our school is receiving this year is: £ 17,780 (2024 – 2025)

This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision for PE and sport in schools. We will be held accountable for how we have used the additional funding to support pupils progress and participation in PE and school sport. We are required to publish on-line information about how we spend the additional funding, including details about our sporting provision alongside curriculum details. This will ensure that parents/carers and others are made fully aware of the PE and sporting provision at St William of Perth Catholic Primary.

This is being used to:

- Deliver a range of high quality PE and sports activities
- Offer opportunities for staff to develop their subject knowledge
- Increase the number of pupils able to participate in after school sports activities
- Increase participation in active playtimes and lunchtimes
- Increase opportunities for pupils to participate in competitive sports events
- Educate pupils about the need for exercise, the effect it has on the body and to teach them about healthy eating



Please be aware that the expenditure and use of the PE sports grant was restricted by the impact of the coronavirus and the restrictions placed on schools including periods of school closure.

Accredited scheme.	<p>Resubscription to PE scheme has increased the amount of children engaged in regular physical activity. This scheme is more accessible for all children than the previous scheme. It provides more opportunities for regular exercise. (Factor 1)</p> <p>The profile of PE and Sport is raised across the school as more children are taking part in PE but a wider variety of resources and areas of the school are being used for PE sessions. (Factor 2)</p> <p>The scheme shows teachers how to lead the lessons, it has videos, pictures and step by step walk throughs of how each lesson should be taught and how to progress this. It also has sections for misconceptions as well as ways to advance the lesson for the more able children. Staff feedback is that the scheme has boosted all confidence with teaching PE, especially in subjects where staff lacked experience. (Factor 3)</p> <p>Within the new scheme, there are topics and skills within sports that have not previously been offered within the school. Such as orienteering within PE. All children are being provided with a broader experience of activities within school lessons. (Factor 4).</p>
